#### **Second STEP Bullying Prevention**

Our school community is committed to making our school a safe and caring place for all students.



Again this year, the Family School Liaison Program (Mrs. Kramer) is delivering the Second STEP Bullying Prevention Program in all K-6 Classrooms. The Program teaches Kindergarten—Grade 6 students how to <u>recognize</u>, <u>report</u>, and <u>refuse</u> bullying.

Students learn about the rules at school to be <u>Safe</u>, <u>Respectful</u>, and <u>Responsible</u> and understand the importance of following those rules so that all students have a positive experience at school.

Recognizing the difference between having a problem vs. a bullying situation is an important part of the lessons. Students understand that peer conflict happens most often when the rules at school get broken and they practice how to use their WITS (Walk Away, Ignore, Talk it Out, Seek Help) to resolve these types of conflict.

Bullying is defined as mean or hurtful behaviour that is REPEATED (keeps happening), INTENDED (intends to cause harm or distress), and has a POWER imbalance (is unfair or one-sided).

Students learn the importance of REPORTING all situations of bullying to staff and other trusted adults, and they practice how to safely REFUSE the bullying.

Bystander Power & Responsibility are important final concepts of the lessons. Students learn how having empathy can help give them courage to take positive action as a bystander to bullying.



#### WITS PROGRAM

- Stands for Walk away,
   Ignore, Talk it out and Seek help
- Teaches children to make safe and positive choices about peer conflict
- Provides a common language children and the adults in their environment can use to talk about and respond to peer victimization



#### The Compassion Project

Our Grade 2 and Grade 2/3 classes are currently learning about The Compassion Project: Kindness in the Classroom. This program introduces students to core social emotional learning competencies, how to practice compassion and empathy, identify emotions, and exercise a growth mindset.





#### Catch My Breath

The Grade 6 classes just began a Vaping Prevention Program with our Family School Liaison, Mrs. Kramer, called Catch My Breath. CATCH My Breath Canada was developed in partnership with University of Waterloo and is based on the peer-reviewed, evidence-based youth nicotine vaping prevention program created by The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston (UTHealth) School of Public Health.

# Cold & Inclement Weather

### SCHOOL BUS INFORMATION

The Transportation Services Manager may cancel buses either individually or collectively when weather/road conditions constitute a safety risk to the students being transported, this includes all scheduled Field Trips.

If extreme weather conditions arise after the students have been delivered to their schools, the Transportation Services Manager may authorize bus drivers to pick up students early and deliver them home. The Principal will notify parents and not allow any elementary students on the bus if the parents have not been contacted.

If it is unsafe for buses to be on the road the Principal will advise parents of the situation and hold students at the school until picked up by a parent.

Buses will not operate in the morning when the temperature at 6AM is -35°C (without windchill) OR -45°C with wind chill or lower at Key Weather Station Locations. The decision for the PM portion of the route will be decided using the same criteria as the AM.

Should cancellation of bus services occur, the Transportation Manager or designate shall post announcements of bus cancellations on Bus Planner. Each bus driver shall notify their route parents of bus service cancellation.


